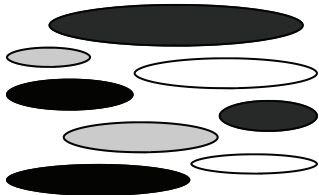

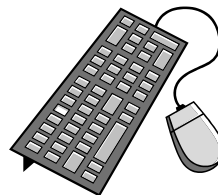

Course Reserves increase again

Architecture Library reserves in January 2008 show an overall increase of 38% over reserves for January 2007. 336 physical items (books, videos, journal issues) were placed on reserve in the Architecture library in January 2008. 241 items were placed on reserve in January of 2007.

E-reserves increased 34%. 73 items were placed on e-reserve in January 2007 and 98 items in January 2008.

Placing an item on re-

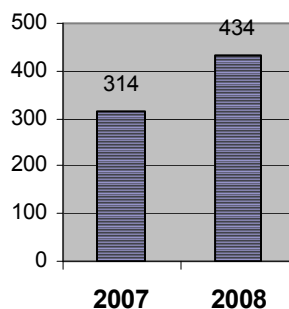
serve is easy. Simply stop by the library or contact Helen Ulrich, Architecture Library Coordinator (HUlrich@bsu.edu, 5-5857).

Copyright restrictions limit each e-reserve to one article from an issue of a journal or one chapter or 10% of a book.

Items on e-reserve are accessed online through the "Reserve Desk" in CardCat. The Reserve Desk also lists the books, videos, and other materials that are on reserve in the library.

Remember: As with all reserves, please submit e-reserve requests 3-7 days before they are needed to allow time for scanning and processing.

Special Feature: Online, Full-Text Periodicals

Definitions

FindIt@BSU — Use these links in databases such as the *Avery Index* to find full text in other databases the library subscribes to, search CardCat for the periodical title, or fill out an interlibrary loan request form.

HTML vs. PDF — In a database such as *Academic Search Premier* or *Business Source Premier* an article will be available as text in HTML (without accompanying pictures or illustrations) or PDF (pages as they appeared in the print journal). Sometimes both formats are offered; sometimes only one format is available.

Embargoed content — Some publishers place an embargo on content from a journal. Embargoed content is not available online until a period of time has passed. Usually this period is 1-12 months.

Start date — Online content for a periodical begins on a specific date that changes from title to title. The database will provide this information in the overview of the periodical title. This information is

also noted in CardCat.

JSTOR — A great resource, this database is intended as an archive. Most participating publishers have defined a "moving wall" of 3-5 years from the present. Full text from a title is made available only for issues older than 3-5 years or the period specified as the moving wall.
