Auto Accident Kills Alumnus, Donor Dr. Andrew Zeberl

Andrew John Zeberl was born on May 5, 1916, in South Bend, Indiana, to Andrew and Theresa. His parents and sister Amelie, preceded him in death. Andrew graduated in 1964 from the University of Michigan with a doctorate degree in Adult Education, after receiving his masters' degree in Public Health Education (1951). He held an M.A. in Health Education from New York University (1945), and a B.S. in Health and Physical Education from Ball State Teachers College (1940).

Dr. Zeberl was a graduate of James Whitcomb Riley High School (class of 1934) in South Bend, Indiana, and was an active

He was a Professor Emeritus, retired in 1982, in the Health and Safety Department at Indiana State University in Terre Haute, an Adult Education Instructor at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor, and taught health and physical education at Upper Iowa University (Fayette) and the Alabama State College for Women (Montevallo).

McKenzie-Walkup Scholarship Helps Students Buy Books

In June 1998, Jim and Bonnie (Walkup) McKenzie established the McKenzie-Walkup Book Scholarship Fund to recognize and reward outstanding students with textbook scholarships and to honor their parents, Gordon and Betty McKenzie and Roy and Marge Walkup.

Each year scholarships are given to two students: one junior and one senior majoring in either Health Science or Health and Safety Education. Six students have received the scholarship since its inception.

The McKenzies named the scholarship in honor of their parents to show their appreciation for the importance their parents placed on education and the support their parents provided to insure that they received college educations.

Jim McKenzie has taught in the Department of Physiology and Health Science at Ball State University since 1989 and served as the Department Chair from 1989 to 1996. Prior to coming to BSU he served on the faculties at Mankato State University in Minnesota, and Bowling Green State University in Ohio. He teaches courses in community health, program planning, and patient education. In addition, he has co-authored three textbooks that are used at universities throughout the United States.

Bonnie McKenzie has also taught at Ball State since

1989. She is currently a faculty member in the English Department where she teaches language arts methods courses to pre-service elementary education teachers. Prior to teaching at BSU she taught in public elementary schools in Ohio and Minnesota and served on the faculty at Bowling Green State University.

Focus on Faculty: Dr. Wayne Payne

His screen savers at home and the office say it all: "Two More Semesters" and "The Second Greatest First Baseman of All Times." Dr. Wayne Payne will retire at the end of the 2002-2003 school year. His return to organized baseball, however, remains tentative.

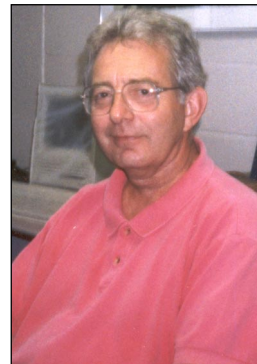
Upon his retirement Dr. Payne will have completed 32 years on the faculty of the Department of Physiology and Health Science, teaching principally in the areas of personal health and the health aspects of aging.

During his tenure on the departmental faculty, he has taught in a variety of locations around the state, as well as at the University's London Centre and in the Department of Defense's Masters in Public Service program in Germany. Special Assigned Leaves allowed Dr. Payne to teach 6th grade health education at the Parker City Elementary School. Additionally, Dr. Payne visited the School Health Education Unit at the University of Southampton (England) and began a writing project leading to the first edition of *Drugs: Issues for Today*, co-authored with Drs. Robert Pinger and Dale Hahn.

As is true for all department faculty members, Dr. Payne served on a wide array of department, college, and university-level committees and councils. He also served

on the board of Planned Parenthood of East Central Indiana and currently serves on the board of the Alpha Center for Adult Day Services. In 1994 he was recognized for Achievement in Teaching by the Center for Gerontology and in 1999 as the Outstanding Doctoral Graduate by the Department of Health and Safety, College of Human Ecology, of the University of Tennessee.

Central to Dr. Payne's career at Ball State University, besides teaching, has been the co-authoring of two successful personal health textbooks with Dr. Hahn. *Understanding Your Health* is currently in its seventh edition, while *Focus on Health* is in its sixth edition. Both textbooks, along with *Drugs: Issues for Today* (3rd ed.), are published by McGraw-Hill College Publishing. Dr. Payne will continue these projects following his retirement and teach on a limited basis.

- #6959 **Andrew Zeberl Family Scholarship:** This fund provides at least one scholarship for students in community health science; it can also provide administrative support for the internship program.
- #6955 **Charles Carroll Health Education Scholarship:** This fund provides a scholarship for a health science graduate student.
- #6953 **Elizabeth and George Neilson Scholarship:** This fund supports a graduate student specializing in the promotion of comprehensive health information through education.
- #6901 **General Fund:** Use of the funds in this account is unrestricted. It is sometimes used to enable guests to attend the awards banquet.
- #6956 **Herb Jones Health Education Scholarship:** This fund provides a scholarship for a sophomore or junior health science major.
- #6954 **Homer Paschall Scholarship:** This fund rewards an anatomy and physiology G.A. for excellence in teaching.
- #6952 **HSC Faculty Scholarships:** Scholarship for Health and Safety teaching major/minor or HSC major/minor.
- #6903 **John P. McGovern Lecture Series:** This endowed account funds the annual McGovern lecture.
- #6958 **McKenzie-Walkup Book Scholarship:** This scholarship provides textbook money for one or more Health and Safety or HSC majors (junior or senior).
- #6950 **Physiology/Health Science General Scholarship:** This is an unrestricted scholarship fund.
- #6916 **Physiology/Health Science Research:** This fund supports the purchase of lab equipment for students.
- #6904 **Public Health Entomology Lab:** This fund supports Public Health Entomology Laboratory research.
- #6917 **Raymond Henzlik Physiology/Anatomy Research:** Supports the research project of a physiology masters degree student.
- #6951 **Russell Siverly Memorial Scholarship:** Supports/rewards student research in public health entomology.
- #6957 **Wilma Bartels Henzlik Scholarship:** This fund provides assistance to students in physiology.

Dept. to help Celebrate Community at *UniverCity*

During the week of September 22-27 Ball State's campus will be abuzz with activity as the weeklong festival *UniverCity* brings scholars, innovators, creators, and leaders to campus. The entire Ball State community is taking part in the planning and sponsorship of lectures, demonstrations, seminars, and exhibits to be enjoyed by Ball State students and faculty and the Muncie community. The *UniverCity* 2002 theme is "Celebrate Community: Cooperation, Collaboration, Connection."
