FROM THE DIRECTOR

During the 2018–19 fiscal and academic year, the David Owsley Museum of Art commemorated Ball State University's Centennial with an intercollege collaboration, a critically acclaimed exhibition, and both a display and a catalogue dedicated to the Ball family's preferred Impressionist painters, J. Ottis and Winifred Brady Adams.

In the Fall, *The Power of Place: 100 Years of Architecture at Ball State University* represented a collaboration between DOMA, the R. Wayne Estopinal College of Architecture and Planning, and University Libraries. Curated by Rebecca Torsell, archivist for architectural records, the exhibition showcased dozens of original drawings, blueprints, photographs, architectural models, and building materials that outlined the history of three major campus structures: the Frank A. Bracken Administration Building, the Fine Arts Building, and the Architecture Building. The show incorporated a section on the future of architectural studies at Ball State with video documentaries and a photogrammetry display.

Also in the Fall, DOMA hosted *Gorey's Worlds*, an unforgettable and mystical show about the American artist and author Edward Gorey (1925–2000). Organized by the Wadsworth Atheneum Museum of Art in Hartford, Connecticut, the exhibition explored Gorey's artistic inspiration by displaying his personal art collection alongside his own creations, like the Gashleycrumb Tinies and the Wuggly Ump, which have charmed generations of children and adults. The exhibition garnered critical praise in *The Wall Street Journal, The New Yorker*, and the *New York Review of Books*. Muncie was its only Midwest venue and near Gorey's hometown of Chicago. Adoring Gorey fans traveled from nearby states to see the show!

In the Spring, Impressions of Love: J. Ottis and Winifred Brady Adams, a Ball State University Centennial Exhibition highlighted the art of Muncie's most important Impressionist painters, J. Ottis Adams and Winifred Brady Adams. Twenty-eight public and private collections joined the museum's holdings for a display of 75 paintings, a dozen drawings, and a few prints as well as props and personal objects owned by the masters. The exhibition was also the largest presentation of Winifred's still life paintings ever gathered in one place. The show's illustrated catalogue contains essays by several experts in Indiana art, including a survey of artist couples in Indiana. The catalogue exists because of a generous grant from the George and Frances Ball Foundation, and copies now reside in every major library in Indiana as well as the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C.

A series of programs instructed, entertained, and delighted visitors in 2018–19. A Fall presentation by Erin Monroe, curator of *Gorey's Worlds* and the Robert H. Schutz Jr. associate curator of American paintings and sculpture at the Wadsworth Atheneum, attracted a large crowd of Gorey fans young and old. Later, in the

spring, Shaun Dingwerth, executive director of the Richmond Indiana Art Museum, outlined the life and career of Winifred Brady Adams in the Edmund F. Petty Memorial Lecture. Final Friday events featured PechaKucha talks based on themes derived from DOMA's exhibitions, such as *Life* and *Death* from *Gorey's Worlds* in the fall, and *Love and Beauty* to complement *Impressions of Love* in the spring. DOMA's spring events reached their apex with the annual Art in Bloom gala and floral exhibition.

The raw data, graphs, and charts presented in this report illustrate the museum's impact. FY2019's near-record attendance, which came close to last year's all-time high figure, demonstrates not only the museum's enduring appeal but also indicates a sustained public interest in its diverse world art collection. The variety of its exhibitions and programs characterizes the workings of an agile institution that can remain relevant during changing times and interests. As DOMA enters a new era under the leadership of College of Fine Arts Dean Seth Beckman and defined by a bold strategic plan accompanied by a new budget model, the museum remains a tangible connection to the past and a manifestation of the University's more inclusive future.




ABOUT THE DAVID OWSLEY **MUSEUM OF ART**

The David Owsley Museum of Art (DOMA) is an 83-year-old university art museum that houses a world art collection with more than 11.000 objects representing civilizations from six of the seven continents. DOMA balances exciting contemporary and historical art exhibitions with engaging displays of the permanent collection in a rich, educational environment that serves both the University and the east central Indiana region.


MUSEUM ATTENDANCE

The annual museum attendance in FY2019 of 35,196 visitors nearly matched last year's record of 35,499 visitors. High-visibility exhibitions, such as *Gorey's Worlds* and *Impressions of Love*, certainly increased museum visits. Several other factors also sustained attendance figures over the last year. For example, the museum is open seven days a week (Monday–Friday 9 a.m.–4:30 p.m.; weekends 1:30–4:30 p.m.) for most of the year, except University holidays. In addition, the museum remains a bridge between the University and city, hosting visitors from both on and off campus.

There are two main types of group visits: those by Ball State University students and visits by public, private, and homeschooled K–12 groups. Other public audiences round out the total number of preregistered groups.

EDUCATION AND OUTREACH

university art museum with an educational mission that not only embraces the local campus audience but also reaches out to students and lifelong learners throughout the region. One measure of educational impact is preregistered group tour counts—guided by DOMA staff or led by outside educators. These organized visits represent a growing number of students engaged in direct encounters with works of art in the galleries.

In FY2019, 305 preregistered groups, both guided and self-guided, accounted for 9,510 visits, which marks a substantial increase from 7,918 visits by 240 preregistered groups in the previous year. In FY2019, organized group visits represented nearly 27% of the museum's total attendance.



BALL STATE UNIVERSITY **STUDENTS**

Ball State students in preregistered groups visited the museum more than 5,400 times in FY2019.

The students hailed from more than 70 different courses ranging from Visual Communications 3 (ADS 441) to Directing 1 (THEA 250), with the largest groups studying the collection as part of their coursework in architecture (CAP 101), art history (AHS 100, 201), rhetoric (ENG 103), screenwriting (ENG 310), history (HIST 150, 151; HONR 201, 202), and political science (POLS 312). Class visits were not limited to the humanities, however, as the museum provided learning opportunities for the study of economics, hospitality, and even human-computer interaction. While the most preregistered class visits came from courses offered by the College of Fine Arts, nearly every college at Ball State University recorded group visits during the year. The number of student visits and variety of disciplines demonstrate a robust interest in the museum and the continued academic relevance of its world art collection as a contemporary instructional tool that promotes critical thinking, visual literacy, and inclusive dialogues.

BALL STATE COURSE VISITS



K-12 STUDENTS

In FY2019, a total of 79 K-12 school groups visited the museum with a total of 3,263 students and teachers (including home-schooled students).

These numbers demonstrate the world art collection's wide appeal for schoolchildren throughout the region, as indicated by the list of 37 schools that made a field trip to DOMA—many for the first time.

DOMA also continued its highly successful SMART (School Museum Art Readiness Tour) program in FY2019. The SMART program provides curriculumbased tours for every fourth-grader in Muncie Community Schools, amounting to 376 students served in 2018-19.

K-12 Student Visits. - Three or four public exhibitions annually


DOMA hosts several community engagement programs, including:

- Final Fridays: an evening program in the museum held twice per semester that invites speakers from the community to mix with Ball State-affiliated presenters to celebrate what's new and interesting in Muncie. Includes a DJ, refreshments, demonstrations, and after-hours opportunities to see special exhibitions.
- Quad Bash: as a focal point of the Quad, the museum is open late with activities and prizes for the incoming class at this Fall event to welcome students to the academic year.
- The semiannual Edmund F. Petty Memorial Lecture features speakers of national importance. On April 11, 2019, Shaun Dingwerth, director of the Richmond Art Museum and curator of *Impressions of Love: J. Ottis and* Winifred Brady Adams, a Ball State University Centennial Exhibition, presented the Petty Memorial Lecture.
- Docent Tours: DOMA enjoys a large and active community of docents, who conduct tours throughout the year, including weekends. In FY2019, 39 docents contributed a total 1.152 volunteer hours to the museum.

FINANCIAL SNAPSHOT


In FY2019, DOMA's activities were bolstered by generous grants from the George and Frances Ball Foundation and the Ball Brothers Foundation. Major contributions from donors, in addition to the museum's Benefactors, Friends, and Art Alliance groups, lifted the total to more than \$100,000 in cash donations. DOMA's signature fundraiser, *Art in Bloom*, netted approximately \$10,000 for programs and projects.

Contributions (Donations, Gifts, and Fundraising)





FY2019 Income by Source (\$1,096,011)*




FY2019 Expenses by Type (\$1,107,898)*




