

#### SUSAN MAGSAMEN

# Director International Arts + Mind Lab, Center for Applied Neuroaesthetics at Johns Hopkins University; New York Times Bestselling Author

Susan Magsamen is the founder and executive director of the International Arts + Mind Lab (IAM Lab), Center for Applied Neuroaesthetics, a pioneering initiative at the Pedersen Brain Science Institute at Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine. Her body of work lies at the intersection of brain sciences and the arts—and how our unique response to the arts and aesthetic experiences can amplify human potential.

Magsamen is the author of the *Impact Thinking* model, an evidence-based research approach to accelerate how we use the arts to solve problems in health, well-being, and learning.

In addition to her role at IAM Lab, she is an assistant professor of neurology at Johns Hopkins and serves as co-director of the NeuroArts Blueprint project in partnership with the Aspen Institute. Prior to founding IAM Lab, Susan worked in both the private and public sector, developing social impact programs and products addressing all stages of life—from early childhood to the senior years.

Susan created Curiosityville, an online personalized learning world, which was acquired by Houghton MifflinHarcourt in 2014, and Curiosity Kits, a hands-on multi-sensory company that was acquired by Torstar in 1995.

An award-winning author, Susan has published seven books, including *The Classic Treasury of Childhood Wonder, The 10 Best of Everything Families*, and *Family Stories*.

Susan is a fellow at the Royal Society of the Arts, and a strategic advisor to several innovative organizations and initiatives. She is also a member of the Society for Neuroscience, the National Organization for Arts and Health, the Academy of Neuroscience for Architecture, the American Psychological Association, Brain Futures, Learning Landscapes, and Creating Healthy Communities: Arts + Public Health in America, among others.

#### **IVY ROSS**

#### VP of Hardware Design at Google; Renowned Fine Artist; *New York Times* Bestselling Author

Ivy Ross is the vice president of design for the Hardware Product Area at Google, which was officially formed in 2016.

Since 2017, she and her team have launched a family of consumer hardware products ranging from smartphones to smart speakers, earning over 200 global design awards. This collection established a design aesthetic for technology products that is tactile, bold, emotional, and undeniably Google.

Previously, Ivy has held executive positions spanning from head of product design and development to CMO and presidencies with several companies, including Calvin Klein, Swatch, Coach, Mattel, Art.com, Bausch & Lomb, and Gap.

Ivy has been a contributing author of numerous books, including *The Change Champion's*Field Guide and Best Practices in Leadership
Development and Organizational Change.
She has also been referenced in *Ten Faces of Innovation*, Rules of Thumb, and Unstuck, among other books.

Ivy has appeared as a speaker at Fortune's Most Powerful Women Summit, and has been cited by Businessweek as "one of the new faces of Leadership." Most recently she was ninth on Fast Company's list of the 100 Most Creative People in Business 2019.

A renowned artist, her innovative metal work in jewelry is in the permanent collections of 12 international museums.

A winner of the prestigious National Endowment for the Arts grant, Ivy has also received the Women in Design Award and the Diamond International Award for her creative designs.

Ivy's passion lies in human potential and relationships. She believes in the combination of art and science to make magic happen and bring great ideas and brands to life.

Sarah Perkins received her BA from San Diego State University and her MFA at Southern Illinois University - Carbondale, and is professor emeritus at Missouri State University. She is a past board member of the Enamelist Society and is currently a member of the Collections Committee at the Ornamental Metal Museum. She has shown her work in the U.S., India, Canada, Europe and Asia. Her work can be seen in Metalsmith, Ornament, American Craft and in the books The Art of Fine Enameling, Contemporary Enameling, The Penland Book of Jewelry and The Art of Enameling, and she was the juror for the Lark Publications book 500 Enameled Objects. She has taught numerous workshops around the United States, including at



Arrowmont, Penland, San Diego State University and California College of Art, as well as at Tainan Graduate Institute of Applied Arts in Taiwan, the University of the West of England in Bristol, and at the Sanskriti Foundation in New Delhi, India. Perkins is represented by Mobilia Gallery in Cambridge, Mass.

Paintings to Challenge Perceptions of Equality by Samuel Levi Jones


Co-sponsored by the Ball State Multicultural Center

He is the recipient of the Studio Museum's 2014 Joyce Alexander Wein Artist Prize—an annual award honoring emerging or midcareer African American artists. His work is in prominent public and private collections

including the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art, the Whitney Museum of American Art, The Rubell Museum, LACMA, and the Studio Museum in Harlem, the Art Institute of Chicago, and the Indianapolis Museum of Art at Newfields.

Dark Matter 2023 Deconstructed and pulped law book covers on canvas, 90 x 100 in.










#### The Ned and Gloria Griner **Art Gallery**

## The Art of Elizabeth Catlett from the Collection of Samella Lewis

**SEPT. 19-DEC. 20** 

Sculptor, painter, and printmaker Elizabeth Catlett is widely considered one of the most important African American artists of the 20th century.

Her work blends art and social consciousness, while confronting the most disturbing injustices against African Americans. Catlett is probably best known for her art from the 1960s and 70s, when she created politically charged, expressionistic sculptures and prints. Born in Washington, D.C., in 1919, she attended Howard University, where she studied design, printmaking, and drawing. In 1940, Catlett became the first student to earn a master's degree in sculpture at the University of Iowa. In 1946, Catlett received a fellowship that allowed her to travel to Mexico City, where she studied painting, sculpture, and lithography. There, she worked with the People's Graphic Arts Workshop (*Taller de Gráfica Popular*), a printmakers' group dedicated to promoting social change through art. After settling in Mexico and later becoming a Mexican citizen, she taught sculpture at the National Autonomous University of Mexico in Mexico City until retiring in 1975.

The works in this exhibition come from the collection of artist, educator, and author Samella Lewis (1923–2022), Ph.D., professor emerita, art history, at Scripps College in Claremont, Calif. Lewis was Catlett's student in the 1940s and Catlett became her mentor and lifelong friend.

The exhibition was organized by Landau Traveling Exhibitions, Los Angeles, and is brought to Ball State University courtesy of the Friends of the David Owsley Museum of Art and Arts Alive!, presented by the College of Fine Arts.

#### A Betrothal


