# Assistant Professor, Nutrition & Health Science, Ball State University

Courses: Health Communication, HSC 494

(Fall 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019)

Mean Course Evaluation: 4.8/5.0 scale

Through both written and oral assessments, students completing the course establish proficiency in understanding the manner in which context (e.g., relational; familial; cultural) affects what persons "know" about health and wellness, utilizing communication theory and research for analyses of problems in health care, understanding the roles played by public health workers and advertising professionals in promoting both sickness, and health, and understanding the ways in which media have been used to promote effective public health campaigns.

# Women and Health, HSC 372/572 (Summer 2018, 2019)

This course provides a general overview of issues related to women and health: chronic disease problems such as heart disease, cancer and osteoporosis, special nutritional concerns, the gynecological exam, reproductive anatomy and physiology, sexuality, fertility and infertility, breast problems, domestic violence and rape, among many other topics.

# Introduction to Health Education & Promotion, HSC 200 (Spring 2017, Summer 2017, Spring 2019) Mean Course Evaluation: 4.89/5.0 scale

HSC 200 provides an overview of the basic philosophy and practice in health education and promotion emphasizing work settings and health educator roles. The course also exposes students to the literature and organizations that support health education. In addition, students are required to complete 20 job shadowing/professional development hours.

# Introduction to Community Health, HSC 180 (Fall 2016, Spring 2017, Fall 2018, Spring 2019, Fall 2019) Course Evaluation Average: 4.95/5.0 (dept. high score)

This course provides an introduction to community health concepts and practice by examining the philosophy, purpose, history, organization, functions, tools, activities and results of community health practice at the local, state, national, and international levels. Through this course, students will develop a working knowledge of the fundamental structures of community health and gain information on health systems that contribute to the promotion, protection, and preservation of health for defined groups of people.

### Assistant Professor, Communication, University of Wisconsin-Whitewater

Courses: Introduction to Graduate Studies, COM 701 (Fall 2014)

This seminar will serve as an introduction to graduate studies and academic research. More specifically, we examine examples of academic research from across the field of communication studies. Further, this course also provides an orientation to the master's in communication at UW-Whitewater as well as an introduction to our department's graduate faculty and their areas of expertise.

# **Introduction to Human Communication, COM 110** (Online Summer 2013 Summer 2014; Face-to-Face Summer 2015)

Introduced college students to principles of communication theory relating to presentational speaking, including audience analysis, organizational skills, informative and persuasive strategies, delivery skills, and group communication skills; directed relevant activities to facilitate the students' practice of and implementation of these principles; evaluated student performance according to these principles.

# Persuasion, COM 345

(Spring 2014)

The primary goal of this course is to provide students with a solid grounding in theories, principles, and strategies of social persuasion as they apply to everyday contexts in which influence attempts take place. This course also emphasizes the ethical responsibilities of persuaders and persuadees.

# **Introduction to Health Communication, COM 363**

(Spring 2014; Fall 2014; Spring 2015)

Through both written and oral assessments, students completing the course establish proficiency in understanding the manner in which context (e.g., relational; familial; cultural) affects what persons "know" about health and wellness, utilizing communication theory and research for analyses of problems in health care, understanding the roles played by public health workers and advertising professionals in promoting both sickness, and health, and understanding the ways in which media have been used to promote effective public health campaigns.

# **Communication Theories, COM 422** (Fall 2013)

Introduced communication undergraduates to the principles of communication study, including theoretical and epistemological foundations. Evaluation of student performance based on two writing assignments involving evaluation of a communication paradigm and literature review of a communication theory.

# Cross-Cultural Communication, COM 424/624 (Fall 2013, Spring 2015, Fall 2015, Spring 2016)

Introduced undergraduates from across campus to the principles of communicating across cultures, including an emphasis on cultural understanding, skills development, and case study.

# **Applied Capstone in Health & Wellness, COM 463** (Spring 2015, 2016)

This advanced level capstone course integrates theory and practice, and involves the application of health communication and health promotion research to a variety of topics. Students will demonstrate an ability to apply theoretical principles and mediarelated skills to problems confronted by health organizations in local communities, involving community-based participatory research practices.

#### Teaching Assistant, Communication, Purdue University (2009-2013)

Courses: **COM 102: Introduction to Communication Theory** (Spring 2012)

Introduced freshman, sophomore, and junior pre-communication undergraduates to the principles of communication study, including theoretical and epistemological foundations. In addition to large lecture, I instructed two independent recitations where main course themes were reviewed and activities and discussions were implemented to reinforce theoretical concepts and application. I evaluated student performance on two major writing assignments involving the understanding and integration of communication theory.

# **COM 114: Introduction to Presentational Speaking** (Fall 2009, Spring 2010, Summer 2010)

Introduced freshmen college students to principles of communication theory relating to presentational speaking, including audience analysis, organizational skills, informative and persuasive strategies, delivery skills, and group communication skills; directed relevant activities to facilitate the students' practice of and implementation of these principles; evaluated student performance according to these principles.

# **COM 204: Critical Perspectives on Communication** (Spring 2010, Fall 2010, Spring 2011, Summer 2011, Spring 2013)

Introduced second year and junior level students to critical and rhetorical perspectives on communication theory including critical thinking, rhetoric, qualitative research methods, and ideological criticism; directed relevant activities to facilitate the students' practice of and implementation of these perspectives and theories; evaluated student performances according to these perspectives.

# **COM 217: Science Writing and Presentation** (Fall 2010; 2012)

Introduced second year and junior level students from computer and physical sciences departments to principles of presentational speaking and writing within science discipline, including audience analysis, organizational skills, informative and persuasive strategies, delivery skills, group communication skills, informative and persuasive writing in the physical and computer sciences; directed activities to facilitate practice and implication of these principles; evaluated student performance according to these principles.

# **COM 256: Introduction to Advertising** (Fall 2011)

Served as a teaching assistant to a large-lecture course introducing second year and junior level students to the fundamental principles of advertising with both theoretical and applied interest, including theories of advertising, advertising techniques, the history of advertising, and contemporary advertising business and law.

# **COM 304: Quantitative Methods in Communication Research** (Fall 2012)

Served as a teaching assistant to a large-lecture course and an independent recitation/lab instructor introducing junior and senior level students to basic research design, statistical analysis, and use of statistical software (SPSS).

# **COM 320: Small Group Communication**

(Summer 2012)

Independently instructed the course which introduces third- and fourth-year communication students to the principles necessary of effective communication within groups. Topics of instruction included conflict resolution, leadership and management styles, task-orientation, role-taking, and negotiation. The course also received a service-learning grant which allowed student groups to apply learned principles as they worked conjunction with my dissertation research on aiding the Voices of Hunger coalition in the implementation of a media campaign and conjunctive community event.
