WELCOME

It is with great pleasure that the Sponsored Projects Administration releases our annual report for fiscal year 2024 (July 1, 2023 - June 30, 2024) – and what a year it has been! We are delighted to highlight and commemorate all of the strong scholarly, educational, and creative sponsored projects proposed and awarded over the past year.

This year has been a year of celebration: We welcomed new members to the SPA team: Carisa Aguilar, Conor Estrada, Whitney Jarnagin, Ellen Leigh and Ann Sheller; celebrated the promotions of Meredith Abbott, Teresa Davis, and Augusta Isley; and congratulated Maria Bumbalough and Liz Haney on the attainment of new certifications. We also wished SPA's Administrative Coordinator, Linda Swartz, a happy retirement after 44 years of serving Ball State. You can read more about our staff updates below.

Another point of celebration: FY24 saw a record-breaking Indirect Cost Recovery (IDC) of \$1,656,209, along with an updated policy to return even more of this recovery to Principal Investigators (PIs). Previously, our PIs received 5% of their IDC recovery in this year's distribution, and moving forward, they will receive 10% deposited into their recognized incentive activity (RIA) accounts. We are pleased to demonstrate that the institution recognizes the administrative effort and diligent work of managing a sponsored award.

Executive Summary: Currently, SPA manages Ball State's sponsored project open portfolio of approximately \$71.8 million. For FY24, over \$16.2 million in external funding was awarded to Ball State, representing 191 funded awards. Research expenditures topped \$8.3 million, and expenditures from all sponsored projects exceeded \$19.7 million. Finally, over \$1.6 million was recovered in indirect costs.

The dedicated staff at SPA are proud to be part of the institutional research mission and to support Ball State University's incredible faculty, students, staff, and administrators involved in the continued pursuit of and engagement in, extramural funding. We look forward to witnessing the remarkable work that this funding supports and the scholarly impact the next year will bring.

ANNUAL REPORT

Sponsored Projects Administration (SPA) supports the University's mission by assisting Ball State faculty, staff, and students in the quest for external funding to carry out their scholarly activity. This support includes identifying appropriate funding opportunities, providing guidance in proposal and budget development, overseeing award administration and management, coordinating award negotiation and assurances, and ensuring compliance with applicable federal, state, sponsor, and university regulations.

SPA offers educational opportunities to the campus at large, oversees the University's recognized incentive programs and the Aspire Internal Grants Program, and hosts the annual Student Symposium at Ball State University. SPA fosters an atmosphere of academic, scientific, and creative inquiry; internal and external collaboration; cross-disciplinary teamwork throughout the sponsored project lifecycle; and community engagement while promoting integrity, responsibility, and ethics in all phases of scientific, intellectual, and artistic inquiry.



SPA PROGRAMS

2023-24 SPA Fellows Program Participation

The SPA Fellows program is a semester-long grantspersonship class for new Tenure-Track faculty, designed to position them for successful grantseeking. The FY24 cohort consisted of 12 (twelve) faculty selected by the College Leadership and Vice Provost for Research. This semester-long intensive educational program is designed to develop grant writing skills in support of externally funded research, scholarship, creative projects, and other fundable endeavors. The Fellows program is led by Jackie Davis, Director of Pre Award, Strategy, and Outreach. Since its inception in 2012, 140 faculty have completed the program.

SPA PROGRAMS

University Indirect Cost Recovery and Distribution

The university recovered \$1,145,187 in indirect costs in the previous fiscal year (FY23). Of that, \$888,879 was distributed per applicable university policy as follows: 5% to the Principal Investigators (\$44,859), 10% to departments/units (\$106,856), and 85% to colleges/VP units (\$737,164).

FY24 recovery exceeded \$1.6 million. The entire recovery was distributed per newly revised university policy as follows: 10% to the Principal Investigators (\$156,450), 10% to departments/units (\$167,174), 60% to colleges/VP units (\$1,004,085), and 20% to the Office of Research (\$344,227).

Recognized Incentive Activity (RIA) Accounts

The Recognized Incentive Activity (RIA) accounts, formerly known as "Research Incentive Accounts," were rebranded in FY24 to better align with the purpose of the funds. RIAs are specialized accounts that allow Ball State employees to receive monetary incentives from many programs at Ball State. In addition to SPA, units such as the Office of Inclusive Excellence, Vice Provost for Academic Affairs, Online and Strategic Learning, Community Engagement, Immersive Learning, and Vice Provost for Research, among others, provide incentives for certain activities. SPA manages the establishment and closeout of RIAs for all units at the University. These accounts remain open in the individual's name during their time at the University. Once an individual leaves, any remaining funds (regardless of source) are reinvested into the Submit program.

Submit Incentive Program

The Submit program incentivizes project teams to submit proposals with budgets over \$20,000 and exceed the standard expectations of the University's External Proposal Submission Policy. Those who meet their Proposal Manager's timeline may receive an incentive payment deposited into their Recognized Incentive Activity (RIA) Account. July 1, 2023-June 30, 2024, 169 proposals received \$61,550 in Submit Incentive funding.

Intellectual Property



to supplement and strengthen the support
for research and creative endeavors that
comes both from departmental and college
resources along with other university





Faculty programs also saw increased proposal volume with the introduction of the Faculty Domestic Travel Program created with funds from the Office of the Provost and Executive Vice President for Academic Affairs, resulting in 200 faculty proposals and \$361,799 awarded to support 194 projects.




Donations of non-monetary products, including software licenses, are not included in sponsored projects totals.

Note for University Five-Year Review: In FY21, the increase in awards granted was due to the COVID-19 pandemic CARES Act federal stimulus funding for both initial awards (represented in a small increase in dollars requested) and supplemental funding issued for existing awards. Expenditures hit primarily during FY22 as recovery continued.





