## PLAGIARISM & ACADEMIC DISHONESTY



## **ACADEMIC DISHONESTY INCLUDES:**

- 1. Using materials not authorized by professor
- 2. Copying from another's paper
- 3. Getting help from an unauthorized person
- 4. Possessing, selling, giving, or buying an unauthorized quiz or test
- 5. Taking a quiz or test in place of another person
- 6. Having someone take a quiz or test for you
- \* 7.Changing material on a graded exam and then requesting a re-grade
  - 8. Communicating with anyone while taking a quiz or test
  - 9. Destroying another student's work

## **PLAGIARISM OCCURS WHEN:**

1 YOU SUBMIT AN ASSIGNMENT AS YOUR OWN ORIGINAL WORK THAT HAS BEEN WHOLLY OR PARTLY CREATED BY ANOTHER PERSON.

Example: You copy and paste information from the Internet onto an English paper without referencing the author, making it look as if it was your own original information.

YOU PRESENT A PREVIOUSLY
WRITTEN WORK FOR A CLASS THAT
HAS ALREADY BEEN TURNED IN TO
ANOTHER CLASS WITHOUT THE
INSTRUCTOR'S PERMISSION. IN
OTHER WORDS, YOU ARE USING A
WORK MORE THAN ONCE.

Example: You turn in a paper during your Junior year for Psychology class that you had previously written for your Freshman year English class.

2 YOU DO NOT ACKNOWLEDGE THE AUTHOR BY EITHER DELIBERATELY OR INNOCENTLY SUBMITTING WORK WITHOUT PROPER CITATIONS, QUOTATIONS, OR PARAPHRASES. \*

Example: You either do not put quotation marks around a sentence you wrote verbatim as it appeared in a book, or you do not cite the source of an idea you are putting into your own words that you read from an outside source.

YOU KNOWINGLY PERMIT YOUR WORK TO BE SUBMITTED BY ANOTHER PERSON AS IF IT WERE THEIR ORIGINAL WORK.

Example: You give your English paper to a friend in a different English class so s/he can put his/her name on it and turn it in as his/her own work.
