### Student Achievement

The department has continued its trend of attracting, retaining and placing high quality undergraduate students through our competitive entry programs. The 2025-26 entering class is 24 students, a record number that has not been achieved in the past 10 years, and a quadrupling of the number of students from the 2022-23 entry year (6). The growth in matriculation and overall increased enrollment has been the most important stabilizing factor for the undergraduate program, as both the university and the state have created new graduation thresholds for program continuation.

One metric we use to gauge student outcomes is performance on the required internship, generally taken during the summer before senior year. BUPD 2025 interns earned an overall score of 9.17 on a 10-point scale when employers were asked about their performance, and no student scored below a 7 in any category. Said one employer, who scored his intern a 9, "she's thoughtful, takes initiative, learns quickly, and pays close attention to detail." Another noted that she's asked her intern to stay on through the fall. Calling her intern "exemplary," a third wrote "(He) successfully drafted a detailed staff report on an alcohol distance variance request case ... the report was well written and included all the information needed for a positive outcome." Collectively, students scored 9.3 on a metric that asks intern supervisors to rate competence in the field of planning; they scored a 9.5 on a metric that asks for their "contribution to the overall goals of the agency or office." Writing, research, surveying, GIS work, and graphics were among the most appreciated skills. At least two of the interns were offered jobs by their internship providers.

We also have increased the number and sophistication of our community engaged studio offerings. The BUPD stands out as a program with five required studios. Each of these studios had a community client and/or participated in a national competition as part of the delivery of the course, over an 18-month period. These community engaged experiences have helped students pursue their interests in a professional context, improved the quality of individual and collective work, and led to internship and employment opportunities.
