Course Information

Course Description

Introduction to sign language systems, including fingerspelling and American Sign Language (ASL). Development of receptive and expressive skills in sign language is emphasized.

Expanded Course Description:

This course introduces students to the foundational skills necessary for developing both production and comprehension in American Sign Language (ASL). Students will learn key ASL vocabulary such as the manual alphabet and numbers, sentence structure, and grammar. Throughout the course, students will develop basic conversational abilities, practice culturally appropriate behaviors, and gain insight into the culture and history of Deaf communities. Additionally, students will explore various topics, such as hobbies, residences, and family.

Prerequisites

There are no prerequisites for this course. Not open to students who have credit in SNLN 251.

Course Modality/Structure

This course is online asynchronous, depending on the section in which you are enrolled.

- **Online asynchronous sections** are delivered entirely online with no required live meetings. Students complete coursework independently according to posted deadlines

and are expected to engage with the material regularly. All assignments and course content are managed through Canvas.

Course Format and Timing

- The course is structured around weekly modules, which include instructional content, readings, assignments, and assessments.
- During fall and spring semesters, the course spans 16 weeks, with one module released per week.
- During summer sessions (10-week format), students will complete multiple modules per week, requiring a faster pace. It is essential to review the course calendar and Canvas announcements regularly.

Each module:

- Opens on Sunday at 12:00 AM
- Closes the following Sunday at 11:59 PM

Assignment Deadlines

- Most assignments are due on Wednesdays and Sundays by 11:59 PM
- Exams are typically scheduled on Tuesdays, though exact dates may vary. Please check Canvas regularly for announcements and due dates.

All content, instructions, and submission links will be posted in the Canvas modules. Consistently checking Canvas for announcements and updates will help you stay on track.

Course Time Commitment

Please be advised that this is a very complex subject matter that requires a significant dedication of time. This is a rigorous course with immersive application of receptive and expressive skills. It is expected that students will spend approximately 2-3 hours of study outside of class for every one hour in class. Since this is a 3-credit class; you should expect to study an average of 6-9 hours outside of class each week.

Course Expectations:

Course expectations are aligned with the rigor of an undergraduate-level class. Students are required to actively engage in all course activities and submit assignments by the designated deadlines. You are expected to effectively utilize all provided resources to achieve a thorough understanding and proficiency with the course content. This will enable you to develop the foundational skills necessary to build basic interpersonal communication skills in American Sign Language.

Course Information

- SNLN 651: American Sign Language Level 1 introduces students to a fully visual, manual language grounded in the cultural and linguistic traditions of the Deaf

community.

- Through the **True+Way ASL curriculum**, students engage in scaffolded learning that integrates language production, grammar, and cultural awareness. Assignments are designed to reflect major ideas in the discipline—such as spatial referencing, visual grammar, non-manual markers, and Deaf cultural norms—and give students repeated opportunities to communicate clearly and ethically in ASL.

Course Goals and Learning Outcomes

This course aims to enhance students' proficiency in American Sign Language for interpersonal communication. Emphasis will be placed on understanding and applying the foundational principles of ASL to develop effective communication skills. By the end of this course, students will be able to:

Course Level Outcomes: *At the end of this course, the students should be able to do the following:*

- 1. Vocabulary Development**
 - a. Recognize and produce vocabulary items in each unit.
 - b. Demonstrate comprehensive mastery of targeted vocabulary words drawn from class items, lectures, and videos.
- 2. Grammatical Features**
 - a. Demonstrate comprehensive mastery of target, content-specific commands, questions, and statements in ASL.
 - b. Identify grammatical features within short dialogues in ASL directed by the professor.
- 3. Conversational and Communication Skills**
 - a. Demonstrate comprehension and conversation-facilitating behaviors.
 - b. Demonstrate comprehension and production of regulating behaviors (i.e. attention-getting techniques, turn-taking signals, and others)
 - c. Comprehend short narratives and stories in ASL signed by the professor, Deaf ASL speakers, or ASL videos added by the professor.
 - d. Demonstrate the ability to create, conduct and terminate a short content-specific conversation.
- 4. Cultural Awareness**
 - a. Analyze and critique competing perspectives of diverse Deaf communities in the United States and Canada, ideas, aesthetic traditions, and cultural practices, and its history.
 - b. Compare, contrast, and interpret differences and commonalities among Deaf and hearing cultures.

Participation

1. Starter Discussion

- Watch the conversation starters. Pick a question to answer and type your response in the discussion board by the due date. Once you type your response, you will be able to see your classmates' responses. Feel free to post additional questions and comments to better understand the conversation starters.

2. Unit + Section Worksheets

- Worksheets are designed to retain and reinforce what is learned in the classroom. Complete the assigned workbook assignments by the assigned due dates.

3. Snapshot Quizzes & Unit + Section Quizzes

- Quizzes are designed to cover content previously learned to ensure you are on the right pace in learning the material. Complete the assigned quizzes by the due dates.

4. Story Comprehension

- At the end of each unit, you will watch a story and answer questions about the story by the due date.

5. Self-Observation Analysis (SOAR)

- At the end of each unit, you are to sign sentences in ASL. You are to record your work and submit your video of your work by the due date. Complete the rubric by comparing your video with the proficient Deaf ASL signer, identifying that you can improve and areas that you are doing well, such as sign accuracy, ASL sentence structure, Non-manual Markers (NMM), etc.

6. **Peer Observation Assessment (POA)**

- At the end of each unit, you will be watching videos of proficient, Deaf ASL signers signing something incorrectly. Identify the error by answering the questions by the due date.

7. **Comprehension Exams**

- The test will cover material presented up to this point in the course. They will include information from the lectures, vocabulary, conversation starter discussions, worksheets, and quizzes.

8. **Productive Exams**

- The test will cover material presented up to this point in the course. They will include information from the lectures, vocabulary, conversation starter discussions, worksheets, and quizzes.
