I. Course Description

This course is a hour lesson in Jazz Improvisation tailored to each individual.

II. Course Objectives/Student Learning Objectives

By the time students get to these lessons they should be working on Level 3 of the Jazz Study requirements.

Level 2-3 tunes are explored. Tunes from Level 1 in different keys will be given. Metric modulation and transcription as well.

III. Rationale

Jazz is the basis for most types of commercial music today. The word “Jazz” encompasses a variety of ever-changing genres of music. The student with a solid background in Jazz will have more success than a classically trained musician especially with sight-reading, rhythms, syncopation AND improvisation. These lessons will help the student explore their own creativity.

IV. Course Expectations

Attendance: attendance is required at each lesson. Two unexcused absences drops the grade one letter. The student is expected to have all material from the previous week ready to go.

V. Performance Requirements

Progress is expected at each of the concerts throughout the year. Students will listen to their solos and critique themselves.

VI. Grading

Attendance, Improvement, Harmonic knowledge and Song memorization.

A – 90-100%; B – 80-89%; C – 70-79%

Attendance, Improvement, scale knowledge and tune memorization.

An “A” student ... Promptly attends all lessons, jazz concerts, AND combo concerts. This student carefully prepares all assigned material from the preceding week’s lesson, memorizes their assigned tunes and, obtains all required lesson materials in a prompt manner. This student practices for 1 hour a day (outside of ensembles) on the material. Their attitude is positive and they are always eager to learn.

A “B” student ... Attends nearly all lessons. This student prepares the assigned material but does not memorize it. They obtain the required materials in a reasonable amount of time. They practice most days (taking a day off here and there outside of ensembles) with a mostly positive attitude and are usually eager to learn.

A “C” student ... Sporadically misses lessons. This student prepares a portion of the assigned material. This student eventually obtains the required lesson materials. They occasionally practice outside of ensembles (never on weekends) for about a half hour. Their attitude is indifferent and they are okay with learning.

A “D” student... Misses several lessons. This student rarely prepares material from the preceding week’s lesson. This student obtains materials by the end of the semester. This student rarely practices outside of ensembles; never on a consistent basis. Their attitude is poor and they are not open to learning.

An “F” student ... Rarely attends lessons. This student never prepares material from the preceding week’s lesson and does not obtain the required material for lessons. They do not practice outside of ensembles. Their attitude is poor and they hate learning.
