I. Course Description

This course is a 3-credit hour class designed to let the student's creativity and organizational skills come together to produce a professional recording of the student's musical ideas.

II. Course Objectives/Student Learning Objectives

Students will utilize everything they have learned to compose/arrange their music for various configurations. They will acquire the musicians, organize the rehearsals, book the studio, critique the rough mixes, fix the rough mixes, sit in on the final mix, get artwork and write the recording notes for this project. The goal is to have a professional product at their senior recital.

III. Rationale

A professional "calling card" is a must in today's world of music. The student can use this product to get into a graduate program, for musical employment, to sell at live events or stream online.

IV. Course Expectations

All music and arrangements should be started by summer of the senior year. They should all be completed by the end of September. Rehearsals should start in late October after the instructor goes through all of the compositions/arrangements. The studio should be booked the FIRST week of school for the week AFTER final exams in December. A \$400 fee is required for the engineer/studio time/ mixes. This is in line with what students pay for an accompanist for a senior recital. The student will have the rough mixes over the Christmas breaks. They will go through and note all changes that need to be made. The changes will be made during the first week of school in January. The studio will have to be booked for this as well.

V. Performance Requirements

These compositions/arrangements will be part of the student's recital Spring semester.

VI. Grading

An "A" student ... Promptly takes care of all things in the Course Expectations paragraph. They are in constant communication with their instructor and provide weekly progress reports with evidence of work done. A journal is required to document everything done.

A "B" student ... Takes care of all things in the Course Expectations paragraph. They are in constant communication with their instructor. They sometimes have a week with no work done towards the project.

A "C" student ... Takes care of some of the things in the Course Expectations paragraph. The instructor has to step in and take care of some things. Lack of communication and sporadic work towards the project.

A **“D” student...** There are no D’s – that is failing for this project.

An **“F” student ...** Does not take care of details in the Course Expectations paragraph. The recording does not happen and the student fails out of the program.
