This course is worth three credit hours. Each hour of credit requires 50 minutes in-class as well as a combined 120 minutes out-of-class work per week, which will be divided between lectures, discussions, and activities as well as individual work (readings, projects, written assignments).

What You'll Explore in THEA 250

Course Objectives:

1. To build on previous analysis class focusing directly on the idea of analysis in pursuit of understanding the action of a play.
2. To delineate how story works within a play.
3. To understand how the ideas of inclusion and representation impact a director's storytelling.
4. To recognize how a director guides the telling of that story with the actors and the production team.
5. To understand the basic concepts inherent in staging a play.
6. To garner a basic understanding of how a director functions through the production process.
7. To create short theatrical vignettes that effectively tell stories through action.
8. To practice collaboration and communication skills.
9. To explore the art of theatre through the role of the director.

Grades are based on the following:

These nine focus areas are key steps to completing the learning outcomes for the class. All assignments add up to a total of 150 points for the entire course.

- 1.) **Concept project:** Using the first play we read, students will create an individual digital concept board expressing their approach to the play along with a requisite number of visual and aural support pieces. **(15 points)**
- 2.) **Blocking project:** 1) Students will be given a ground plan and a series of behaviors by two people in a space. Using the instructions, they will create a blocking pattern with given circumstances that fits both the space and the defined actions. 2) Students will be given a series of physical actions for which they will create circumstances that give context to the actions and then record those action using a video camera. These films will be presented in class and discussed. **(15 points)**
- 3.) **Song project:** Students will create a short vignette (30-90 seconds) inspired by a piece of music that must be incorporated into the vignette in some manner. The vignette must have a beginning, middle, and end. The vignette must have dramatic conflict. The vignette must have a character or characters that are dealing with the conflict. **(15 points)**
- 4.) **Art project:** Students will create a short vignette (30-90 seconds) based on a piece of art (painting, sculpture, photograph). The piece of art must have a somewhat realistic being in it. At some point the vignette must incorporate into the vignette the pose of the main character. The vignette must have a beginning, middle, and end. The vignette must have dramatic conflict. The vignette must have a character or characters that are dealing with the conflict. **(15 points)**
- 5.) **Scene project:** The class will be split into manageable work groups. Each group will be given a short scene from a play (Title to be determined) which they will direct utilizing their classmates as actors. These scenes will be presented in class with written critique to follow. **(15 points)**
- 6.) **Analytical Paper for *Far Away*:** For the first play read in the class the students will write an analytical paper that will include character analysis and the tracing of action through one scene using the method from Backwards and Forwards. **(25 points)**
- 7.) **Analytical Paper of *Appropriate*:** For the second play read in class, the students will do an analytical paper that includes exploration of the world of the play and how that might influence production, exploration of character development throughout the play, exploration of the arc of the play, and exploration of the story the director wishes to tell with the play. **(25 points)**
- 8.) **Class Participation:** Approximately 25-30% of class will exist as Discussions/Lectures. Students will receive grades based on their participation in discussions as well as a short answer to a question posed out of the discussion. **(15 points)**
- 9.) **Show Attendance:** You must see at least 2 on campus shows during the semester. You must upload a selfie of yourself at the show with your program to Canvas. These will be discussed in class. **(5 points for each show = 10 points total)**

Late Work Policy

Attendance and Punctuality

Attendance: For this class that meets Tuesday and Thursday, no student can miss more than two classes. If you miss more than two classes, you will be docked 1 letter grade for each additional absence until you drop to a “C”. You cannot miss more than 10 classes in a semester and still pass the class. You will be asked to withdraw from the class. In addition, no grade of “W” will be given to a student after midterm, unless he/she is earning a grade of “C” at the time of withdrawal. No grade of “I” will be given to a student who is flunking.

There is a second category of absences, including extended and documented absence related to illness or issues of physical health (mono, broken leg, etc.), and recurring absences due to mental health issues as documented by a letter from Disability Services. If this category of absences causes your TOTAL absences from the class to rise above 6, you will be deemed unable to fully complete the work required to earn credit for this course, and you will be asked to withdraw from the course. The instructor will be sure that such situations are remedied with solutions that do not impact your GPA

(an Incomplete or, in rare cases, a late withdrawal). The instructor will work with you to lay out clear expectations regarding how the course work will be completed.

Finally, the following absences are excused and no number of absences accrued under these conditions may affect the student's status in the class: religious holiday; pregnancy, jury duty, death in the family, travel for university business as documented by an official Ball State Travel Notice.

Attendance will be taken using Attendance Plus+, so you will need an electronic device at the beginning of class to input the code.

Workspace

In order to foster an appropriate environment for our work, I ask that we treat our classroom as a focused, *working* space. Phones should be turned off prior to entering the classroom. The respect, dedication, and focus that I ask of you DOES NOT mean seriousness...a heightened sense of play is essential for our work as theatre artists.

Physical Interaction (Physical Intimacy/Stage Violence) Between Students.

This class should not include scene work that involves stage violence or physical intimacy. If you feel your scene **MUST** have stage violence or intimacy, **PLEASE SPEAK WITH ME FIRST!** This material must always be approached with the priority on clear communication of expectations, clear consent of all performers, and a respect for student safety. At the beginning of the semester, you will be asked for your consent regarding stage violence or physical intimacy. If physical interaction with other students is not a part of your learning process or makes you uncomfortable, notify your instructor immediately so that accommodations can be made. Physical contact by anyone in the classroom should not and will not be used to demean you in any way and will only take place once clear and enthusiastic consent has been obtained. Any scenes involving violence or physical intimacy will be fully blocked / choreographed in class under instructor supervision. Any rehearsal of this material outside of class must follow the existing blocking / choreography exactly. If you are ever uncomfortable with a specific scene, exercise, or partner, notify your instructor immediately. If you are uncomfortable speaking with your instructor, contact departmental Associate Chair Tyler Smith (tasmith2@bsu.edu).
