COURSE DESCRIPTION:

An investigation of the nature and role of the sport industry of different world regions. Includes an analysis of selected national systems, international and comparative sport management, and application of theory to manage the growing diversity in U.S. sport organizations due to growing migration of athletes, coaches, and professionals.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

1. Develop a theoretical framework to investigate sport system and managing structures in selected countries.
2. Investigate political, economic, socio-cultural, and educational perspectives in selected countries and how these concepts relate to sport.
3. Make a comparative analysis of aims, objectives, programs, and management concepts of sporting activities in selected countries.
4. Investigate the scope, nature, governance, and managing structure of international competitions.
5. Develop a better socio-cultural perspective of other nations and their sport culture.
6. Develop a better understanding of globalization of sport and its effect on their national sport system.

CLASSROOM ENVIRONMENT:

The in-class lesson format will typically include (but is not limited to) the following: class lectures, lecture-discussion, small group discussion, individual assignments, group assignments, presentations, in-class and written case studies, exams, and online discussions. Students are permitted to use laptops, tablets, and other mobile devices to follow lectures and/or take notes, but such devices should not be used for anything unrelated to the class. **The instructor reserves the right to change the policy regarding the use of electronic devices if they are abused for activities unrelated to the class.** Please keep cell phones in silent mode. If a student must take an emergency phone call during class, please step outside for the call. Blue tooth equipment, MP3 players, and headphones are not permitted in class.

STUDENT EXPECTATIONS:

Students are expected to attend class, arrive on time, and be fully prepared to engage while in class. Preparation involves completing all assigned readings, taking notes as applicable, asking questions of the instructor prior to class meetings, and preparing questions for the class to consider. Students are expected to be willing to discuss all readings in detail and take part in class activities to the fullest extent. It is expected that all students will support other members of our learning community by engaging in meaningful and respectful conversation, supporting intellectual discovery, and participating in the journey of shared learning. All communication in class, out of class, and online is to be civil, courteous, and constructive. Students are expected to uphold the highest standards of academic integrity and honesty.

ATTENDANCE POLICY:

Attendance will be recorded, and absences will be classified as excused or unexcused. Students with two or fewer unexcused absences will be eligible to earn the full allocation of Class Attendance/Participation points. Students with more than two unexcused absences will have Class Attendance/Participation excluded from the calculation of their final course grade. Absences will be excused according to the criteria below.

University sponsored activities (e.g., athletic participation, band, ROTC, etc.) will be considered excused absences. Students attending University sponsored activities should inform the instructor **before** they miss class (every absence) and remain responsible for all content covered during missed classes. If students do not inform the instructor prior to an absence related to a University sponsored activity, the instructor reserves the right to consider the absence unexcused. Students must also supply documentation to confirm their participation in the sponsored activity.

Unavoidable medical situations will be considered an excused absence. This includes any emergency situation or prolonged illness that occurs during class time. Students must provide documentation from the medical provider addressing the medical issue. The documentation must include the date and time of the medical visit(s). Without documentation, no matter the medical issue, the absence could be considered unexcused. A family emergency does not qualify as an excused absence unless it is an unexpected, unavoidable medical emergency to an immediate family member and is accompanied by documentation verifying the medical emergency and the need for the student to miss class due to the emergency.

Funeral and bereavement leave, as defined by the *Ball State Student's Bill of Rights and Responsibilities*, will be considered an excused absence. Please note: "A student may contact the Office of Student Rights and Community Standards to request that an informational notice (without verification) be sent to the student's instructor(s). The student will provide documentation to each instructor. Given proper documentation, the instructor will excuse the student from class and provide the opportunity to earn equivalent credit for assignments missed. If the student is not satisfied with the outcome, he or she may appeal as outlined in the Ball State University's Procedure for Student Bereavement Appeals."

Class Attendance/Participation

Attendance will be recorded, and absences will be classified as excused or unexcused. Students who meet the following criteria will be eligible to earn the full allocation of Class Attendance/Participation points:

- Two or fewer unexcused absences
- Come to class fully prepared to engage in an active, vital discussion about the readings
- Contribute to class discussions
- Prepare questions for our learning community to consider
- Support members of the learning community by engaging in meaningful conversation, supporting intellectual discovery, and participating in the journey of shared learning

Students with more than two unexcused absences will have Class Attendance/Participation excluded from the calculation of their final course grade.

2038 Winter Olympics Bid Proposal Presentation

Working in groups of 2-4, students will develop a bid proposal for a viable city to host the 2038 Winter Olympic Games. The proposal will result in a presentation approximately 20 minutes in duration. A full rubric is available on the course's Canvas site.

International Sport Marketing Plan Presentation

Working in groups of 2-4, students will develop a marketing plan with relevant international oriented goals and objectives for a sport organization of their choice. The plan will result in a presentation approximately 20 minutes in duration. A full rubric is available on the course's Canvas site.

Corporate Social Responsibility Proposal Presentation

Working in groups of 2-4, students will be provided a case study from which they will develop a Corporate Social Responsibility proposal. The proposal will result in a presentation approximately 20 minutes in duration. A full rubric is available on the course's Canvas site.

EXAM INFORMATION:

There will be two exams, each valued at 100 points. Exams will be based on any and all information and materials utilized in class lectures, class discussions, the textbook, and any additional readings made available through the Canvas course site. Exams may include true/false, multiple choice, matching, fill-in-the-blank, and short answer questions.

Exams will be offered online via Canvas in a timed format. Students will only have one attempt at each exam, must complete the exam in one sitting, and will be presented questions one at a time without the ability to go back. Consequently, it is recommended that students be fully prepared before beginning an exam.

Exams must be taken during the scheduled window of availability. If students have prior knowledge of an extenuating circumstance such as an official University activity, medical procedure, etc. that will prevent them from taking an exam during the scheduled window, students may request to take the exam **before** the scheduled test window, **but not after**. Students must request such accommodations by contacting the instructor at least one (1) week prior to the scheduled exam window. There are only two exceptions to this rule:

1. Personal illness or injury that prevents the student from taking the exam and can be documented by the proper authority.
2. Death or serious illness to a member of the student's immediate family that can be documented by the appropriate authority.

A missed exam will result in a **ZERO**.

Exams in this course require the use of LockDown Browser and Respondus Monitor. These tools prevent students from opening additional browsers or browser tabs, turn off copy/paste/screen capture for the duration of the exam, and disable printing. The software also flags if the student's face leaves the frame or if someone else's face becomes visible. Video and audio will be recorded during the exam session. Offline resources, including, but not limited to notes and the textbook, **MAY** be utilized during an exam. However, working with other individuals in any manner during an exam is **NOT** allowed and will be considered cheating per the course's Academic Integrity and Dishonesty policy.

If you experience any computer issues during an exam (internet access issues, accidental submission, computer restarts, shuts off, etc.), e-mail the instructor immediately. If a student fails to report an incident to the instructor, the exam will be graded as submitted. If the incident is confirmed, then the exam will be cleared, and the student can re-take the exam.

EMAIL ETIQUETTE:

Emails need to include complete words and phrases with proper capitalization and punctuation. Emails will only receive a response if they can be read. Be sure to include your name, course, and section number.

COURSE WITHDRAWAL:

There is only one withdrawal period. It extends from the 6th through the 45th day of classes during the fall or spring semester.
